This last will and testament of George Smiley, dead, was produced in Court, proved by the Oath of Thomas Conate and David Duncan, he of the witnesses thereto, Subscribed and to be recorded. And on the motion of Thomas Conate & David Duncan the Esquire therein named Certificate is granted them for attaining a probate thereof in due form upon their giving security where they came personally into Court with Zachariah Burnett & Richard Gooding their Securities & entered into and acknowledged bond in the penalty of \$2000. Conditioned as the law directs for the due and faithful administration of said decedent's estate & performance of his will.

The Will upon his will of Michael Stone deceased made at his own house in the time of his last illness, on the 31st day of August 1814. The said decedent did at the time and place aforesaid call upon James Bramblett and Hilary Bramblett to take notice that the following was his will. 1st he directed that his Negro man Joe should be sold for the payment of his debt. 2^d he directed that the whole of his property real and personal should be kept by and remain in the possession of his wife for the support of the Family, until his youngest child come of age or chose a Guardian at which time he directed that his land should be sold and the proceeds thereof as well as the whole of his estate be equally divided between his children. He also promissed and committed to writing this 17th day of September 1814.
