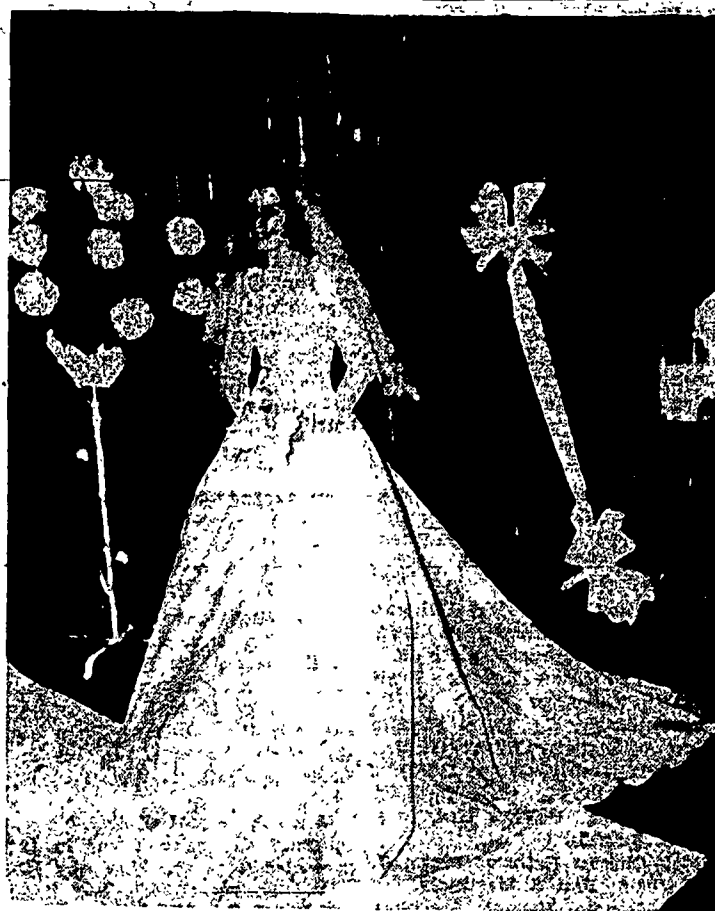

After the business meeting, the hostess served refreshments and a social hour was enjoyed.

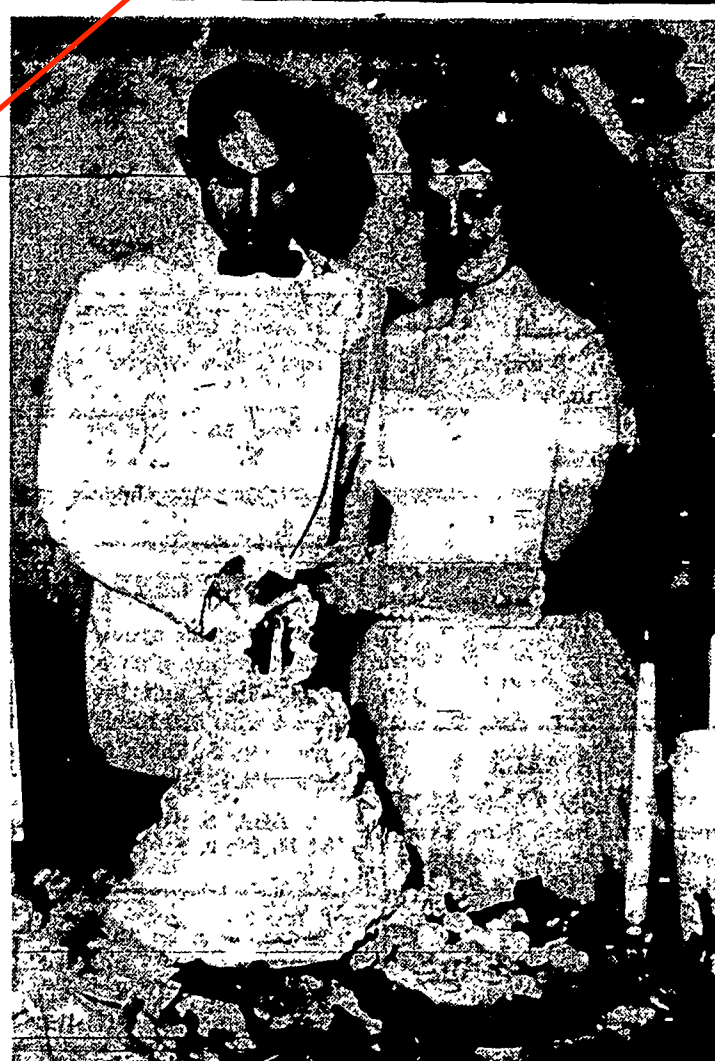
WCTU Will Meet At Christian Church
