It is estimated that approximately 15 million dollars worth of the burley type tobacco alone annually fails to reach the market because of improper curing or lack of curing. Cigar leaf and the aromatic tobacco are confronted with the same problem.

Exhaustive tests, beginning in 1933, have shown that only charcoal fires provide the controlled, steady heat required for the proper drying of the leaf in tobacco sheds and warehouses. Charcoal briquets, because of their superiority over lump charcoal, are ideal for this purpose, and it was only the tremendous demands for other briquet applications that prevented their widespread adoption by tobacco growers.

In months to come, furfural production will be a major source of income, according to Cumberland's president. The petroleum industry uses large amounts of this yellowish, sweet-smelling liquid in the removal of nitrogen, sulfur and unstable hydrocarbons from gas oil and lubricating oil in the furfural refining process. Furfural is also used in the manufacture of synthetic rubber, nylon and other plastics and synthetic resins, antibiotic pharmaceuticals, protective coatings and enamels, insecticides, weed killers, furfural derivatives such as furfuralphenol, furfural alcohol, furfuralacetone, and in the refining of linseed oil, fish oils, wood resins and turpentine.

Because of its complex molecular structure, it is impractical to produce furfural synthetically. Furfural has been recovered by treating oat hulls, cornstalks, or corn cobs with mineral acids and distilling, but the tremendous demands of the chemical and refining industries have thus far considerably outrun these sources of supply.

In his welcoming talk to the assembled guests and Gov. Chandler, Thomas N. Peck, president of Cumberland Corporation said, "Dedication of this plant is a big day for us. We hope to grow and expand in this fine section of Kentucky."

Mayor J. Heber Lewis of Burnside presided at the dedication ceremony. The Right Reverend William R. Moody, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Lexington, gave the invocation. The Burnside Eagle Scout Troop and the Pulaski County High School Band took part in the ceremony.

Mrs. Curtis is survived by five sons, Ralph Curtis, Evansville, Ind., Earl Curtis, Somerset, Charles Curtis, Long Island, N. Y., Arnold Curtis, Springfield, Ohio, and Glen Curtis, Indianapolis.

She is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Lynn Johnson, New Matamoras, Ohio, two brothers, John Botkins, Colorado, and Howard Botkins, Somerset, nine grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday in the First Methodist Church, the Rev. Ralph Wesley officiating. Burial was in the Somerset cemetery.

To Serve Baptist Convention Post

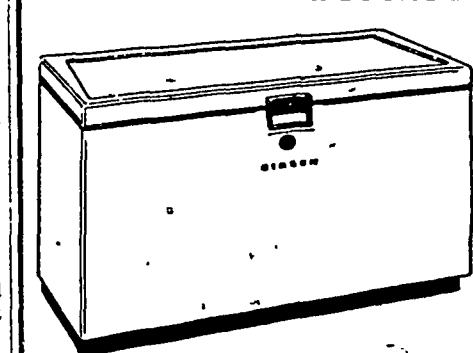

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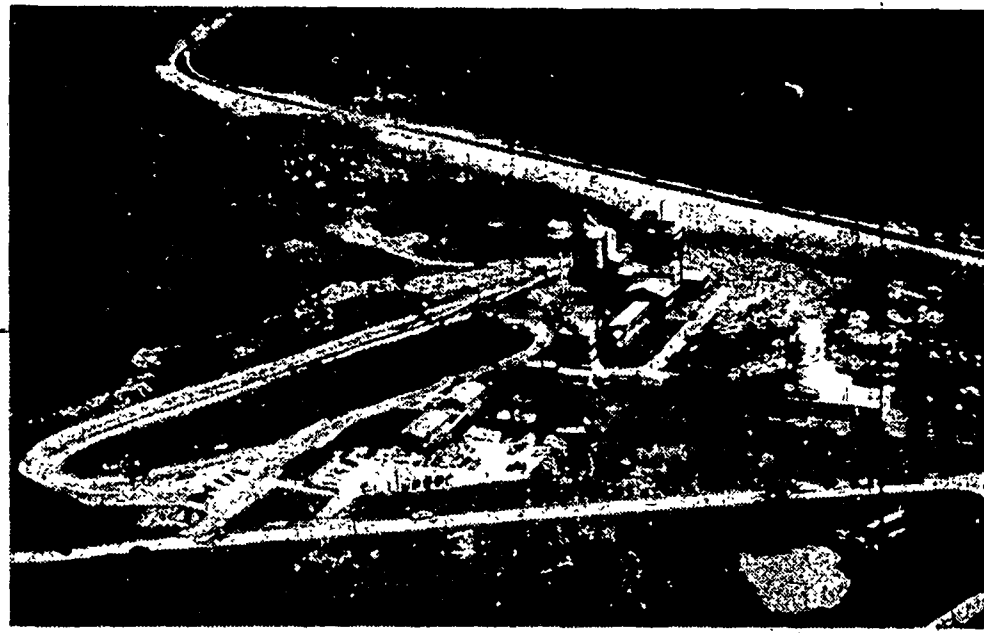
